

Foundation Celebrates 75th Anniversary!

The Arboretum Foundation was founded in 1935, one year after the official establishment of Washington Park Arboretum. This year marks the 75th year that we have provided vital support to Seattle's beloved Arboretum.

It all began with a small group of impassioned individuals who were determined to help the University of Washington and City of Seattle create an Arboretum in the Pacific Northwest, despite the challenges of the Great Depression and Second World War. Individuals such as Loren and Edna Grinstead, O.B. Thorgrimson, Herbert Ihrig, Sophie Krauss, and Donald G. Graham.

In the early days, the Foundation's role included acquiring plants for the Arboretum, funding general maintenance, and paying the salary of the director. That role has morphed and expanded over the years, but it has always remained true to our primary mission of sustaining and enhancing this special green space.

Key historical highlights include the development of the volunteer units in the late 1930s; our first plant sale in 1947; underwriting the construction of the Pat Calvert Greenhouse in 1959; funding the restoration of the Japanese Garden Tea House in 1981; gifting of the Donald

G. Graham Visitors Center to the City of Seattle in 1985; co-development of the 2001 Arboretum Master Plan with our University and City partners; and the funding of Phase 1 of the Pacific Connections Garden, completed in 2008.

Remembering the Grahams



Many individuals have made important contributions to our organization—and thus the Arboretum—over the past 75 years, but perhaps none more than Donald Goodnow Graham. A lawyer by trade, Graham was one of the original founders of the Foundation. He donated a prodigious amount of his time and expertise in those formative years and for many years thereafter. In his history of the UW College of Forestry, *The Long Road Travelled*, Henry Schmitz writes that without the devotion of Graham and then Dean of the College, Hugo Winkenwerder, “there would not be [an] ... Arboretum today.”

Donald Graham's wife, Juanita, also played a significant role in the history of the Foundation and in the development of the Arboretum. In the late 1930s, she organized the first of our volunteer Units. “She modeled the units on the guilds of the Children's Orthopedic Hospital,” remembers Donald Graham, Jr., the Graham's son, himself a generous supporter of the Arboretum Foundation. “They served the Arboretum in the same way the guilds served the hospital—by developing public interest and support.” Unit 1—now called the Juanita Graham Unit—is still active today and, along with our 28 other units, raise important funds for the Arboretum.

The Grahams lived next door to the Arboretum, in the Broadmoor neighborhood of Seattle, for much of

520 Bridge Advocacy Yields Major Results

The Arboretum Foundation has been advocating strongly on behalf of Arboretum interests in the debate over the design of the new 520 Bridge. The Washington State Department of Transportation's most recent bridge design is evidence that our work—which is part of a collaborative effort by numerous organizations, public officials, and interest groups—is bearing fruit. The updated design:

- removes all current ramps from the Arboretum and obviates the need to build new ones;
- eliminates general purpose on-ramps from Lake Washington Boulevard to the 520, reducing traffic impacts on the Arboretum;
- includes a traffic management plan to reduce traffic flow on Lake Washington Boulevard below current levels (this may include tolling);
- calls for the use of “quieter” pavement on the bridge's main line going across the Arboretum to reduce noise levels;
- creates good pedestrian and bicycle connections among the Arboretum and the Montlake and University neighborhoods.

The Arboretum and Botanical Garden committee will be working with the state on the fine details of the plan as it moves forward. A Herbarium Milestone

On May 18, the Hyde Herbarium in the Center for Urban Horticulture created its 20,000th dried specimen sheet—a lovely *Cornus kousa* from the garden of Mrs. Otis Hyde (a lifetime member of the Arboretum Foundation), who along with her husband Charles made a gift to establish the herbarium in 1985. University of Washington staff hosted a small celebration to mark the occasion. Around 90 percent of the specimens in the herbarium are from the Arboretum. They provide a useful reference for identifying the wide range of plant species in the collection. ↔

New Developments



Work Begins on Gateway to Chile

If you've been on Lake Washington Boulevard recently, you may have noticed that changes are underway at the south end of the Arboretum. In April, Seattle Parks & Recreation began site preparation for restoration of the now overgrown Holmdahl Rockery and the creation of the Gateway to Chile Garden. The work includes the removal of thirty-four mature trees, including some bigleaf maples. Seventy-three Chilean

trees will be planted in their place to create a stunning new display. These include monkey puzzle (*Araucaria araucana*), winter's bark (*Drimys winteri* var. *andina*), Chilean fire bush (*Embothrium coccineum*), *Austrocedrus chilensis* (a beautiful conifer that can live to be more than 1,500 years old), and *Pilgerodendron uviferum* (an endangered species). We anticipate that the new garden will be completed in early fall. Come watch the transformation!

Farewell to Julia Maywald!

Our Director of Major Gifts Initiatives, Julia Maywald, has decided to leave the Arboretum Foundation to pursue other passions. She joined the Foundation staff in January 2008 and has done a marvelous job managing our Pacific Connections campaign and Arbor Circle program. She was instrumental in the success of last year's drive to raise \$425,000 to fund the creation of the Gateway to Chile. The Foundation would like to thank Julia for her invaluable service and wish her the best of luck in her future endeavors. The search is on for Julia's successor. We expect to hire a new Director of Development early this summer. ☺

their lives, and were avid gardeners. "They built a home there in 1931," recalls Donald Graham, Jr., "and immediately started developing a garden. They kept buying up lots in Broadmoor to expand the garden and eventually owned seven of them! My father had a particular interest—a scholarly, collector's interest—in rhododendrons. By the time of his death, there were several hundred different varieties in the garden."

It was Graham's fascination with rhododendrons that brought him into contact with Brian Mulligan—the plantsman extraordinaire who would eventually become the Arboretum's most influential director. "My father was stationed in England during the Second World War," says Donald Graham, Jr. "He visited the de Rothchild estate of Exbury on four or five occasions because of his interest in their rhododendron breeding program. Brian Mulligan worked on the estate, and the two became friends. After the war, my father returned home, and when the director's position at the Arboretum became available, he knew exactly the right person for the job. He wrote a letter to Eddy de Rothchild asking permission to offer the job to Brian, and the rest is history."

In 1985, the newly built visitors center at the Arboretum was named in honor of Donald Graham. "That was a nice surprise," says Graham, Jr. "But in the end, it was not about the recognition—for either of my parents. It was about doing something they thought was worthwhile. They were in love with the Arboretum—like so many of the other folks who have given a lot of thought and effort to create this special place. The great success story of the Arboretum is the one of so many people working together towards this shared goal." ⇨

Arboretum Scene

Aesculus parviflora
Bottlebrush Buckeye

After the clamorous colors of *Rhododendron* and a host of other spring shrubs has faded, a quiet greenness settles over Seattle in summer. Yet our quiet season is punctuated by certain surprises. Perhaps the greatest of these is *Aesculus parviflora*. Rather than conform to the arborescent habit typical of its genus, this shrubby southeastern U.S. species reaches eight feet high and politely suckers, slowly forming thickets to 12 feet across. Composed of five or seven leaflets, the palmate leaves create a beautifully patterned backdrop for the 8- to 12-inch wands of small, white flowers that tip each branch in late July and early August.
